# **A NEW START?**

This time of year is often one in which people try to make a new start in some area of their lives. Perhaps they try to exercise more or to eat less, to go to the gym more often or to go to the pub less often, to give up a bad habit or to take up a good habit.

We all know how hard it can be to stick to these kind of resolutions. The stress of returning to work combined with the gloom of dark Winter days soon tests our resolve to breaking point. Are you still keeping your New Year's resolutions, now that we are a few weeks into the year?

Some people don't bother trying to make a new start. They recognise that they don't have it within themselves to change themselves. And yet most of us are still strangely drawn to the idea of a new start in life. We like the idea of putting the past behind us and pressing on towards some new vision or goal. We may even hope to become a different person – a new and improved version of ourselves.

The Christian faith offers to do exactly this for us. The Apostle Paul wrote these words: "If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!" (2 Corinthians 5v17). By turning to Jesus Christ and putting our trust in him, we experience the ultimate new start: the past is gone and we are made new.

Paul goes on to emphasise that this is not something that we can ever achieve by our own efforts. He says, "All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ" (2 Corinthians 5v18). The gospel of Jesus Christ does not simply provide a new list of rules or a new set of resolutions – it offers a restored relationship with the God who made us. And this new relationship transforms us from the inside out.

Those who are cynical about our ability to change ourselves are probably wise. Experience teaches that we can't simply reinvent ourselves. But we can all be made new, if we stop relying on ourselves and start trusting in the Saviour who was born as one of us in humility, who died for all of us in agony, but who now reigns over each of us in glory. Jesus Christ alone has the power to make us new.

#### **CARBON MANAGEMENT**

(by Alastair Mumford)

First you need to understand your carbon footprint. Then you need a plan to get that footprint smaller whilst reflecting the limited time and money you have. Then you start the plan. This, in very simple terms, is carbon management.

Carbon management means managing greenhouse gases (GHG) produced by your business through doing what it does. The main GHGs are carbon, methane and nitrous oxide. Whether it's using electricity or sending your waste to landfill, GHGs are tied into nearly everything you do. managing them you can Βv understand them and then reduce levels. Not only is this good for the environment but it's increasingly becoming good for your wallet through increased carbon taxes and the rising cost of energy.

Organisations need to calculate their GHG emissions using a robust methodology and often finding data can be tricky. Although we know how much carbon is produced for every unit of electricity we may not know the figure for producing a book of prayers. Both play a part in a church's overall GHG emissions. However, it is important not to get bogged down in detail when sometimes an estimate is good enough. This is where experience comes in and developing a good argument so stakeholders can see and agree with your rationale.



Additionally, although you may know the level of GHG emissions per mile driven by a petrol car you may not know the total mileage of your organisation. This knowledge gap needs to be overcome and a monitoring procedure put in place.

Calculating the carbon footprint is easy compared to making it smaller, and you need to develop a strategy in line with your ambitions but reflecting the limited time and money available. By understanding which parts of your organisation are the most carbon intensive and which are the easiest to decarbonise, activities can be prioritised and milestones set to reach your goal.
