THE CALL OF CHRIST

The season of Lent will soon be upon us again. This forty day period has traditionally been a time of self-examination and reflection for followers of Jesus Christ. Just as our cars need an annual MOT to make sure that they are still roadworthy, so our spiritual lives require a time of careful inspection to check that we are on the right track.

This year the mission community will be using the season of Lent to consider afresh the call of Christ. What does it mean to be a Christian? What is it that God looks for in our lives? How can we be sure that we are walking in step with the Holy Spirit? These are the kinds of questions we will be exploring together as we listen again to Christ's call.

We will hear his call to repent (Mark 1v15). Repentance doesn't mean feeling guilty or having some good intentions, it means a deliberate decision to change the direction of our lives. We repent in order to follow Jesus (Mark 1v17). Jesus does not call people simply to follow his example or to follow his commands, but to follow him. Jesus calls people to a personal relationship with himself, so that our whole lives are orientated around him.

And Jesus calls us to put our trust in him to provide for our spiritual needs. Just as children trust their parents to provide for them, so we must become like children to enter the kingdom (Mark 10v15). Peace with God can never be achieved by good behaviour; it can only be received as a free gift, in the same way that children freely receive good things from their parents. Trusting Jesus means abandoning our self-righteousness and selfreliance.



In response to this gift of forgiveness and peace, Jesus calls us to serve other people with humility, just as he served us by laying down his life to pay for our wrongdoing (Mark 10v45). And our response will be committed and whole-hearted. Jesus said that the greatest commandment is to love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength, and to love our neighbours as ourselves (Mark 12v30-31). Nominal Christianity, which believes in theory but not in practice, falls far short of what Jesus calls the greatest commandment.

Being a Christian is the most radical decision that anyone can make. It will involve denying ourselves, taking up our cross, and following Jesus wherever he leads us (Mark 8v34). This is a tough calling. Following Jesus is not for wimps! When we come to see just how challenging the call of Christ is, we will realise that we can't do it alone. We need the support and encouragement of our fellow believers in order to keep going. For real followers of Jesus, church is a necessity not a duty.

More details of our Lent programme will appear over the coming weeks. There will be daily readings, mid-week meetings and Sunday services.

Why not give yourself a spiritual MOT?

ANN'S NATURE NOTES

Now it is winter and most things are dormant; the flowers and butterflies waiting, like me, for the spring. I have recently been asked about owls, and they are most easily seen in the winter. Often they hunt in the day time, quartering fields. The most common one is the Tawny Owl; this is the largest of our common owls. It is resident and is the one we hear in the evenings - calling twit (male) twoo (female). It is a bird of the woodland and spends a lot of time hiding near the trunk of large trees, among the ivy. If it is seen in the daytime, by smaller

birds, they make quite a noise mobbing it and trying to get it to move away, as they consider it a threat. They are nocturnal, so are not often seen. The next most common one is the Barn Owl. It is a beautiful white, ghostly, silent flier. It is a crepuscular (a Dawn and Dusk) bird. It is a bird of farmlands and traditionally the nested in old barns and sheds, but as there are fewer of those about now. they use trees as well. The barns were excellent places to nest, as that was where their food (rodents) also lived. Then there is the Little Owl. This was brought in by Thomas Powys in 1842 to the Midlands, as a captive bird.

They escaped and now thrive in England, where they are resident. In the winter they sit motionless in a sunny spot, on a roof or in a hole in a wall. I often see one at Steart, and there is another at Cruwys Morchard. A lovely little bird, but I have yet to see one flying. Sadly they only have a life expectancy of 3 years. Then there are two migrant owls. The Short- eared Owl is the more common one: it can be seen in the daytime guartering fields looking for rodents. It has long narrow wings and a round face. The other migrant is the Long-eared Owl, which is quite rare. I have only seen one. It is the smallest, and is distinguished by its ear tufts, hence the name. It is another crepuscular bird and like the Tawny Owl, it hides in trees in the daytime.

CARBON FAST FOR LENT
