
Or we would go to Killerton house, dressed in Victorian costumes to see if we could leave the workhouse to work in the laundry.


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Harvest Online

Christmas



FROM STEPH

Steph's Book Reviews

I always like to have a couple of books on the go, and as well as several novels, I have read some interesting books over the Summer. The first one is the Time Bestseller:

Why I'm no longer talking to white people about race' by Reni Eddo-Lodge

It has had rave revues, and comes with some powerful endorsements, which can, for me have the opposite effect. It's not a difficult book to read – but it is a challenging one and has opened up a number of useful conversations. So many of us avoid difficult conversations – religion and politics being top of the list, but I suspect for many of us, race is up there too. It's good to talk. It's even better to listen and reflect. And I think this book made me listen, reflect and pay attention to an important issue that cannot be easily dismissed.

Another book on a similar subject, relates to the church. Ben Lindsay is a black British born pastor pastor of a large church in South London. His congregation is mainly white. Through the book he shares personal experiences, Biblical insights and interviews to explore the ways in which race has impacted the whole of society, and white privilege in the church.

This book might be the start of a conversation for many of us. I found the questions at the end of each chapter helpful. I suspect, from what I have read, that it is a conversation that has been well underway for decades, and perhaps some of us need to catch up!

We Need to Talk About Race: Understanding the Black experience in White majority churches by Ben Lindsay

Finally, <u>A.D.A. France-Williams has written 'Ghost Ship'</u>a book about institutional racism and the Church of England.

If you are a 'Church Times' reader, like me, you may have read about a private member's motion going through General Synod calling for practical support and solidarity for the many victims of the Windrush scandal. You may also have heard in various sections of the press the Archbishop of Canterbury's admission that the Church is 'deeply institutionally racist'. It's shocking to hear. As a paid up member of the CofE it makes me feel extremely uncomfortable. But it does make me want things to be different. Many would consider Archbishop Justin's statement to be a sad, welcome and long overdue admission and France-Williams gives voice to the experience of BAME clergy and laity within the church. As one reviewer put it, 'Ghost Ship' is a revelation, full of imagery fraught with background, freighted with pain. It is powerful, prophetic, poetic testimony, a threnody, a warning, a call to repentant action and a vision of another future. If you have a vocation to ministry in the C of E; if you exercise ministry in the Church in any capacity; if you hold power in the Church in some regard- or hope to do so: you should read it.' (Ben Fulford, Senior Lecturer in Systematic Theology, University of Chester) Yes, it's a threnody. A song of sorrow and lament. These books are worth reading. I hope you will. It's

a conversation that needs to be had.



FROM THE ARCHIVES

'TODAY' 50 years ago

October / November, 1970

The power of, and disruption caused by, certain trade unions was the subject of the lead article in the October issue. "Nothing is more bitterly condemned in the Bible than what the tyrant unions are being egged on to do".

Two farmers at Seven Crosses had grown long-stemmed wheat which, in early August, could be seen arranged in traditional stooks. The 'reed' would, after threshing, be sold on for thatching.

Members of the Mothers' Union were commended for the generous spread provided following the confirmation service at Withleigh.

Loxbeare's country market raised £37 in aid of the village room. All of the church fabric repairs listed in the guinguennial inspection had been completed.

The Oakford gymkhana was a great success, raising £100, despite heavy rain immediately prior to the event. Due to an increase numbers, the Guides had now split into three patrols.

Rackenford's harvest social, at Creacombe village hall, was to feature the choir from Templeton in Wales.

Stoodleigh's solid-fuel heating system was in urgent need of replacement. The harvest thanksgiving had been well attended, but ideas were being sought on the form of event in future years.

A concert was held to mark the completion of restoration work on the tower, bells, and erection of a new screen in Templeton church, and featured the choir of Templeton in Wales who staved for the weekend in homes in the parish. The first Harvest Home celebration for several years had gone very well.

Washfield's harvest celebrations were attended by fewer people than in the past, something which has become a trend in recent years

Lamp standards had now been erected in Withleigh churchvard to light the church path. The first gymkhana had been a great success, and had made a profit of £60.

NATURE NOTES

None of us will ever forget 2020, so looking for some relief I have been pondering what Nature provided that would allow for more happy memories.

The kind weather is a good place to start because it allowed for more songbirds to survive the winter and produce many young. More than any year we have had queues of them on the rail by the birdfeeder where they sat, oblivious to any danger and looking confused at arriving in the world.

The bright days have been a blessing for all and gardens have flourished like never before with all the constant attention – so save for the brief period of worry over grass growing [no rain in Devon!] we can say it is a good summer. Given the conditions and more time to observe it is fascinating to puzzle over what has gone well and to wonder why.

Up in the village the apple trees are heavy with fruit but down in our corner they are disappointing despite having had much blossom in the spring. I refuse to go around with a paintbrush so trust that the bees will do better next vear.

No doubt parishioners will have their own views of Nature's year but I would suggest it is exceptional in terms of both acorns and blackberries. We seem to have been crunching over the former for a few weeks but I cannot remember a year when they were so evident in the trees where they hang as pale green droplets against the [still] dark green leaved background.

The annoving squirrels have been notable by their absence so they are probably very busy. All children know not to eat acorns and apparently they are poisonous due to the tannin content. Adults should be grateful because the same tannin enables oak wood to flavour their drinks when stored in barrels.

There are no such concerns with blackberries, but remember it is very bad luck to eat or collect them after 10th October because the Devil [apparently] will have spat on the bushes on the previous evening.

However to raise spirits a more fitting finale to the end of the natural year of 2020 might be a rousing chorus of Hearts of Oak.

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LIGHTHOUSE NEWS

Slowly, is seems that Lighthouse is getting back to a "new normal", but not quite where we were before the coronavirus outbreak. With reduced opening hours and only two tables in the revised café we seem to be coping. Thank you all for bearing with us during these difficult times and for co-operating by wearing your face masks and using the hand sanitizer when entering the shop.

Over the past few months we have had three Bible related incidences, which are worth relating. During the early days of the lock-down while the shop was closed, one of the trustees would visit each week to check everything was alright. On one occasion a homeless man was sitting on the pavement across the road. He came across and knocked on the shop door. The trustee opened it and explained that we were shut. He said he just wanted a Bible and so the trustee took him down to the second-hand book section and offered him a choice from those there. He selected one and explained that living on the streets, he often had his things stolen, and had recently lost his Bible. He left clutching his new Bible.

The second story revolves around the large print Bible in the shop window. Actually, it is a New Testament and Psalms. A foreign gentleman came into the shop and asked to buy it. Apparently his eyesight was poor and the large print would be easier for him to read. It was explained that that copy was not for sale, but that we did have a large print Bible he could buy, with slightly smaller print. He bought it and left.

A few weeks later he was back, again asking to buy the Bible in the window and again it was explained to him that it was not for sale. But we did promise to see if we could find a copy for him. We checked our copy and it was supplied by The Gideons, so Penny rang their local representative and it turned out they had a copy they could let us have. A couple of days after it was delivered to the shop, the gentleman turned up again and was given his own copy. He too, left clutching his new Bible.

The third incident also relates to the Bible in the shop window. There is often a queue for the Nationwide next door which forms outside Lighthouse. As the people stand there they sometimes look into the shop. One morning a man put his head round the shop door and asked if we could turn over the page of the Bible as he had reached the bottom of the page!

One of our prayers at Lighthouse is that the Word of God can spread out into the world as the rays of light radiate from a lighthouse. This is usually accomplished by the small Biblical texts in greeting cards and on other items which we sell, as well as Bibles and other books. But the stories above show us that God is able to get His Word out in ways we don't expect. That is why we believe that he wants Lighthouse to be a beacon on the high street

Christmas is coming and from about the middle of October Penny will be putting out her Christmas stock. Real Christmas cards that share the story of the nativity and other gifts will be available.



A word from Justin Montague

Hello to all the church family across the Exe Valley. My name is Rev. Justin Montague and I am very much looking forward to joining Rev. Steph Gordon-Jeffs and the Mission Community for 4-weeks this Autumn and Winter on a placement as part of my continued ministry development.

Currently I reside in Tiverton, where I moved to in 2018 to begin serving my curacy as a minster in the Church of England with the parish of St George and St Paul's.

During my first week in mid-Devon I found myself high up in the Exe Valley on the Stoodleigh Cricket Club outfield during the long-lasting heat wave of that summer. As I tried to concentrate on fast flying cricket balls as I fielded the boundary, I had to try really hard not to be distracted by the beauty of God's creation, rolling hills that stretched for miles from that high vantage point upon the Exe Valley. Attending Worship in the Exe Valley Mission Community During COVID-19 What to Expect !

Calverleigh, Cruwys Morchard, Loxbeare, Oakford, Rackenford, Stoodleigh, Templeton, Washfield, Withleigh

Before you arrive:

We can only accommodate a certain number of people at a service, so we it will be essential that you book a seat via the church office 01884 250417 or email office@exevalleymissioncommunity.org or by leaving a message on the answer phone. When you book, we will take some contact details.

These will be kept for 3 weeks after the service and given to Track and Trace if someone from the service later tests positive to coronavirus.

When you arrive:

The doors will open 15 minutes before the service. Before that you will need to wait on the church path, 2 metre markings will be chalked on the path to help you stay a safe distance from others in the queue.

The welcomer will let people into the building in households/bubbles.

Face coverings will be required and you will be asked to sanitize your hands on arrival, then go immediately to a seat in church.

The seats in church will be arranged in ones and twos at 2m intervals from each other. We ask you to go straight to a seat and to remain there for the duration of the service.

Gentle music will be playing to help you pray as you wait for the service to begin.

Windows and doors may be left open to allow some ventilation, so you may notice it is a little cooler than you expect.

During the service:

Single use service sheets will be placed on the pews and we ask you to take these home with you. Due to aerosol spread, there will be no singing during the service.

We ask that when you are saying the responses that you speak quietly and prayerfully - again to reduce risk of droplet spread.

When we share the peace, we cannot move from our places - we will simply wave or make a sign of peace to those in other households.

During Communion, only bread will be distruted. The priest will wash her hands before and after distribution. The bread will be brought to you at your seat.

If you do not want to revieve communion for any reason, that is absolutely fine

- just hold your service sheet in front of you and the priest will pray a blessing instead.

After the service:

After the priest has processed out, the welcomer will ask people to leave a row at a time. Please wait for the welcomer to ask you to leave. Please take any orders of service home with you. Please do not stop to chat while leaving the building. Once out of the building you are welcome to talk in small groups of not more than 6 in the churchyard.

Please do not block other people's exit from the building and remember to stay 2m apart from people from other households.

If you test positive for coronavirus up to three weeks after the service, please let the office know.

<u>JIMMY'S RIDE</u> written by Charlie Lambert, who now lives and farms astride the Cruwys Morchard/ Withleigh border. An inspiration to all cycle riders. They raised over £40,000 for the Hospital.

Inspired by the excellent care given to an old soldier by Erskine Hospital, a group of Royal Scots Dragoon Guards, past and present, cycled 500 miles around the North Coast of Scotland, to raise much needed funds for that care to continue. With a total age of 450, the 8 man team endured storms, wind and rain to cycle clockwise from Inverness back to Inverness taking in some breath taking scenery, including the famous 2054 foot 1 in 5 climb up Bealach Na Ba. Following a route adapted for bicycles by Mark Beaumont, the world record holder for cycling around the world, the team camped on through Applecross, the route

Gruinard Bay, Clachtoll, Durness (where the entire school of 7 pupils turned out to cheer us on), Tongue and Lairg. The final section around the Black Isle was particularly memorable given the beautiful sunshine; half the journey with a tail wind aiding an average speed of over 20mph, then the second half with a head wind reducing progress to 9mph! But what a trip and what a worthy cause; Erskine Hospital - looking after nearly 1000 veterans a year, and for every single year since 1916 at a cost of £30,000 a year for one veteran. We do hope you are all remaining well during these difficult times. Just when we thought we were slowly coming out of lockdown, the virus strikes back!


At the time of writing, it looks as though Christmas celebrations will be on hold for this year. Normality, where have you gone?

Gloria Daniel

Like many of us during lockdown, Gloria had more time on her hands. Prompted by events in America and in Bristol she started to research her family tree, which led her to Bristol and to the Exe Valley. It has been a great privilege to welcome Gloria and to hear some of her story - Steph

I would like to start this article by saying thank you, to Steph and her amazing team of church wardens in Stoodleigh and Oakford. To Chris, Margaret and Dawn, thank you for sharing your local history with me.

I came to the South West and the Exe Valley searching for the history of Thomas Daniel and his sons (also called Thomas Daniel) These men enriched themselves and their families on the stolen labour and trafficking of 3900 men, women and children including my great, great grandfather, John Isaac.

To the memory of Thomas Daniel and his family, I found:

Alabaster commemorations and the West Rose window in Bristol Cathedral.

Four stained glass windows and a grade two listed family plot in St Margaret's, Stoodleigh. Stockland, Somerset revealed the church of St Mary Magdalene, rebuilt by the Rev Henry Arthur Daniel.

St Mary the Virgin in Henbury, Gloucestershire was the final resting place of Thomas Daniel, so called 'King of Bristol'.

Lastly, St Peter's of Oakford housed a 1940 memorial plaque to Mary Francis Daniel, the youngest daughter of Thomas Daniel Daniel and 3 unattended headstones to the last known members of this family in these parts.

I was astonished at all the memorials to these men in the house of God. I thought of the gospels relating the narrative of The Cleansing of the Temple by Jesus when he expelled with fury the merchants and the money changers.

My research has shown me that Thomas Daniel was indeed a money lender as well as a financier and ship owner to those who would profit in the most immoral of trades.

So much history has been generously shared with me by Steph and the church wardens and I am humbled and grateful at the kindness of complete strangers.

A Brief History of the Daniel family - Chris Whitehead

In 1833 slavery was abolished in the British Empire, but the price of geting the bill through Parliament was compensation to the owners of slaves for the loss of their property.

Thomas Daniel (1762-1854) was born in Barbados to a family which owned many plantations in the West Indies. They grew sugar cane, processed it and shipped the product to Bristol for sale there.

He, his father, and his brother John moved to Bristol and continued the family business. He married into another merchant family and had at least ten children all born in Henbury (Gloucs) which is also where his father is buried.


When slavery was abolished, he owned 3900 slaves working on the sugar plantations and so he received a great deal of money in compensation - in todays terms it would be millions.

Around 1836 he bought a number of English estates including Stoodleigh. These property purchases may have been a way of investing the compensation money.

One of his heirs was his son, Thomas (1798-1872) who lived for much of his life at Westbury-on-Trym (Somerset) (most of his children were baptised there), but is buried in Stoodleigh. He had a son Thomas Daniel Daniel (1823-1862) who married into the Carew family, lived in Stuckeridge house, and had four children but died before his father.

It was the son of Thomas Daniel Daniel – Thomas Carew Daniel (1848-1923) – who inherited the Stoodleigh estate. When his grandfather died he relinquished his army commission, returned to Devon and married. He seems to have thrown himself into all those activities which were considered proper for a landowner. He sat as a magistrate, entered local horticultural shows and was Sheriff of Devonshire for several years. He also spent a considerable amount of money on improvement of the estate. A block of cottages next to the New Inn was demolished and several new cottages built. He enlarged St Margaret's church and built Stoodleigh Court, but never moved in. Instead he lived at Stuckeridge and is buried in Oakford churchyard. There were no children from his marriage; I think the last remaining relative in the area was his sister Mary, who died in 1940. *Please see the article written by Gloria Daniel on page 18.*





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
